#### JOSEPH MASON REEVES Admiral, United States Navy 1872 - 1948

The DLG-24 is named in honor of Admiral Joseph M. Reeves, whose naval career spanned fifty-two years and three wars. In these years of duty, Admiral Reeves held many positions of leadership and responsibility including Commander in Chief, United States Pacific Fleet, from 1934 to 1936. Admiral Reeves received many foreign decorations, the

Navy Cross, and the Distinguished Service Medal.

Joseph Mason Reeves was born in Tampico, Illinois, on November 20, 1872. He was appointed to the Naval Academy from the Seventh District of Illinois in 1890. As a Naval Cadet he was an outstanding football player. His first duty after graduation in 1894 was in the USS SAN FRANCISCO. In 1896 he joined the battleship OREGON, operating with the Pacific Squadron, and was in her when, under the command of Captain Charles E. Clark, USN, she made her famous cruise from the West Coast to the Caribbean in the spring of 1898. Four days after the OREGON's arrival at Key West, Florida, she sailed with Admiral Sampson's flagship, the USS NEW YORK, for the Cuban coast, where they were joined by other ships of the North Atlantic Squadron. On June 1, 1898, operations were commenced against Admiral Cervera's fleet in Santiago Harbor which culminated in the destruction of that force on July 3. For this duty he was advanced four numbers in rank on the list of Lieutenants (junior grade) and was commended as follows:

"For displaying eminent and conspicuous conduct in managing the machinery of the vessel OREGON July 3, 1898. The leading engineer officers of this vessel so developed the efficiency of the motive power as to cause the attainment of a speed unusual to the ship, thereby enabling her commanding officer to place her in the very conspicuous position that she occupied on that occasion, thus contributing in a very important

degree to the success of the OREGON in the battle."

In 1901 he had instruction at the Naval Torpedo Station, Newport, Rhode Island, followed by a second tour of duty in the USS SAN FRAN-

CISCO during 1902.

In 1903, he served, in the rank of Lieutenant, as Aide to the Commanding Officer in Charge of the Asiatic Fleet, first with Rear Admiral Yates Stirling in the USS WISCONSIN, later with Rear Admiral Charles J. Train in the USS OHIO. He was next an Instructor in the Department of Physics and Chemistry at the Naval Academy and also had duty as Head Football Coach from 1906 until 1908. Upon completion of that duty he joined the USS NEW HAMPSHIRE in 1908 and was assigned as her Ordnance Officer until September 1909, when he assumed the duties of Fleet Ordnance Officer on the staff of the Commander in Chief, U. S. Atlantic Fleet, Rear Admiral Seaton Schroeder. He came ashore in 1910 and was a member of the Board of Inspection and Survey for three years and in command of the Naval Coal Depot at Tiburon, California. In April 1913 he assumed command of the USS JUPITER, the first electrically propelled vessel of the United States Navy. He was detached from the JUPITER in April 1914 and was in command of the USS ST. LOUIS and various other vessels until June 1915, when he rejoined the USS ORE-GON, this time as her Commanding Officer. In June 1916 he reported as Senior Aide to the Commandant of the Navy Yard, Mare Island, Cali-

During World War I, he was Commanding Officer of the battleship MAINE, which operated with the Atlantic Fleet, and for "exceptionally meritorious service in a duty of great responsibility . . ." in that command was awarded the Navy Cross.

He served as Naval Attache at the American Embassy, Rome, Italy, from February 1919 until April 1921, when he assumed command of the USS PITTSBURGH. In October of that year he was ordered to Mare

Island, California, for duty as Captain of the Navy Yard, and From 1922 until 1923 commanded the USS NORTH DAKOTA. He next attended the Naval War College, Newport, Rhode Island, and, completing the senior course, served a year on the staff. He qualified as a Naval Aviation Observer at Pensacola, Florida, and after October 1925, served twice as Commander Aircraft Squadrons, Battle Fleet, interspersed with duty, June 1929-June 1930, on the Navy's General Board.

He reported for duty as Senior Member of the Board of Inspection and Survey, Pacific Coast Section on September 15, 1931, and became Commandant of the Navy Yard, Mare Island, California in June 1932. He assumed command of the Battle Force, with the accompanying rank of Admiral, in June 1933, and on June 15, 1934 hoisted his flag in the USS PENNSYLVANIA as Commander in Chief, United States Fleet. After two years in command of the Fleet, he was ordered to the Navy Department, where he served as a member of the General Board until October 1, 1936, when he became Chairman of that board. He continued to serve in that capacity until his retirement effective December 1, 1936.

He was recalled to active duty in the Office of the Secretary of Navy on May 21, 1940. He was advanced to the rank of Vice Admiral on the Retired List, to rank from February 23, 1942, pursuant to Act of Congress effective that date, having been especially commended for performance of duty in actual combat. On July 16, 1942, he was advanced to the rank of Admiral on the Retired List. For his meritorious service during the World War II period he was awarded the Distinguished Serv-

ice Medal and was cited as follows: "For exceptionally meritorious service . . . as Navy Department Lend-Lease Liaison Officer from March 1941 to December 1945; as senior Military Member of the Munitions Assignments Board and Chairman of the Munitions Assignment Committee (Navy), from February 13, 1945, to November 8, 1945; and as Chairman of the Joint Munitions Allocation Committee, From January 11, 1944 to September 2, 1945. Displaying unusual qualities of leadership and ability in diplomatic negotiations with the senior military representative of the United Nations, Admiral Reeves rendered invaluable service in carrying out his manifold duties fulfilling many difficult tasks requiring great resourcefulness in coordinating and processing the request of the Allied governments for military equipment. His skill and initiative in bringing about the harmonous distribution of finished materials to meet the ever pressing demands of all United Nations Services were essential to the integration of the Allied military organization, and his brilliant analysis of the over-all situation were substantial factors in executing logistic plans in accordance with strategic requirements. Distinguishing himself by his sound judgment, exceptional tact and zealous devotion to the varied and complex details of his various assignments, Admiral Reeves contributed materially to the successful prosecution of the war and upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.'

On December 23, 1946 he was ordered relieved of all active duty. He died on March 25, 1948 at the United States Naval Medical Center, Bethesda, Maryland. He is survived by his son, Joseph M. Reeves, Jr., who at the time of his death lived at 406 North Normandy Place, Los Angeles, California. Also surviving him was a brother, H. H. Reeves of Rugby Road, Schenectady, New York, and a niece, Mrs. Eileen R. Wood, wife of Commander Robert B. Wood, USN, whose official home address is Ham-

In addition to the Navy Cross and the Distinguished Service Medal. Admiral Reeves had the Sampson Medal (USS OREGON); the Spanish Campaign Medal; the Victory Medal, Altantic Fleet Clasp (World War I); the American Defense Service Medal; the American Campaign Medal; and the World War II Victory Medal. From the Government of Italy he was awarded the Crown of Italy (rank of Commander) and the Diploma of the Order of Saints Maurice and Lazarus (grade of Commendatore).



# UNITED STATES SHIP REEVES DLG-24

Although there has been another ship bearing the name Reeves, the USS REEVES is the first ship named after Admiral Joseph Mason Reeves. She is one of a new class of guided missile frigates. The REEVES carries some of the most modern weapons afloat, giving her the capability to deal effectively with any threat on the high seas. Her powerful sonar, ASROC, and torpedo installations equip her to fight and kill submarines at extended ranges. Her supersonic Terrier guided missiles have the capability of intercepting and destroying aircraft many miles from their intended targets.



# CYRUS R. VANCE DEPUTY SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

Cyrus Roberts Vance was nominated as Deputy Secretary of Defense by President Johnson on January 9, 1964, confirmed by the Senate on January 27, and sworn into office on January 28.

Secretary Vance was born in Clarksburg, West Virginia, March 27, 1917, the son of Mrs. Amy (Roberts) Vance and the late John C. Vance.

He was graduated from Kent School in Kent, Connecticut, where he was Senior Prefect of the student body, rowed on the crew, and played football and hockey. He received a Bachelor of Arts in 1939 from Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut, majoring in economics. He continued his studies at Yale Law School, earning a Bachelor of Laws degree in 1942. He graduated with honors from school and college. He received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree from Marshall University in 1963.

In 1942, upon graduation from law school, Secretary Vance enlisted as a Midshipman in the U. S. Navy's V-7 program. He graduated as an Ensign in the U. S. Naval Reserve on August 5, 1942 and became an instructor in naval ordnance at the Prairie State Midshipman's school in New York City. From 1943 to 1946, he served in destroyers in both the Atlantic and Pacific, and was separated from the service as a Lieutenant on March 28, 1946.

After separation from the Navy following World War II, Secretary Vance served as Assistant to the President of the Mead Corporation, from 1946 to 1947. He entered the practice of law in 1947 with the firm of Simpson, Thacher and Bartlett of New York City, becoming a partner of the firm on January 1, 1956. He continued as a partner of that firm, specializing in litigation, until January 16, 1961.

Mr. Vance served as Special Counsel to the Preparedness Investigating Subcommittee of the Committee on Armed Services, United States Senate, from 1957 to 1960. He was Consulting Counsel to the Special Committee on Space and Astronautics, United States Senate, in 1958. After withdrawal from law practice in New York City, he served as General Counsel of the Department of Defense from January 29, 1961, to June 30, 1962. In this capacity he also served as Chairman of the Committee on Adjudication of Claims of the Administrative Conference of the United States during its existence, from April 13, 1961, to December 31, 1962. Prior to his present appointment as Deputy Secretary, Mr. Vance served as Secretary of the Army from July 1, 1962 to January 28, 1964.

Mr. Vance is a member of the American Bar Association, the New York State Bar Association, and the Association of the Bar of the City of New York; and a Fellow of the American College of Trial Lawyers. He was admitted to the United States Supreme Court in 1960.

Mr. Vance is a Trustee of Kent School; a former Director and Chairman of the Board, Union Settlement Association, Inc., 1953-61; and a Trustee of The Boys' Club of New York, 1959-61. He is a member of the Executive Committee, Yale Law School Association, and has also served as Vice Chairman of the Alumni Fund.

Mr. Vance is a member of the Century Association and Links Club, New York City, and The Metropolitan Club, Washington, D.C.

Secretary Vance was married to the former Grace Sloane of New York City on February 15, 1947. They have five children: Elsie Nicoll, Amy Sloane, Grace Roberts and Camilla (twins), and Cyrus Roberts, Jr.



CAPTAIN WYNNE A. STEVENS, JR., USN

Captain Stevens was born in New Bedford, Massachusetts in 1917. He is the son of Wynne A. Stevens and N. Elsie Stevens of Baltimore, Maryland. He is a graduate of the College of William and Mary, the George Washington University Law School, the Naval War College and the National War College, and is a member of the Order of the Coif and Phi Beta Kappa. Captain Stevens entered the Navy in 1940 and was commissioned as an Ensign in the United States Naval Reserve on May 15, 1941.

During World War II, he served in the Amphibious Forces and participated in five naval engagements in the African-European theatre and two engagements in the Pacific theatre. Following World War II, his tours at sea have been in destroyers, including command of the USS Barton (DD 722).

His shore duty has included a tour in the Office of the Judge Advocate General, the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief, U. S. Pacific Fleet, and as Military Assistant to the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff for Congressional and Politico-Military Affairs.

Captain Stevens is married to the former Phyllis Hornsby of Norfolk, Virginia. They have three children; a son, Midshipman Wynne A. Stevens III, U.S. Navy, and two daughters, Tina (17) and Linda (15).

#### **EXECUTIVE OFFICER**



COMMANDER FELIX SALVATORE VECCHIONE, USN

Felix S. Vecchione was born in Spring Lake, New Jersey, on 13 September 1926. He attended High School in nearby Neptune, N. J., and from there entered the New York State Maritime Academy. Upon graduation he was awarded a Third Mate's License and a commission in the Naval Reserve and, for a brief period of time, he sailed in the Merchant Marine with Gulf Oil Corporation.

Shortly after the outbreak of hostilities in Korea he requested to come on active duty in the Navy and in September 1950 was ordered as a member of the recommissioning crew of the USS TELFAIR (APA-210). He served in the Attack Transport until June, 1953, during which time the TELFAIR made three extended deployments in support of the United Nations Operations in the Far East. From 1953 to 1955 Commander Vecchione served with the Amphibious Training Command, Atlantic Fleet and while there he was selected for appointment in the regular navy. Nine months at the Navy's General Line School followed.

From there he served successively at sea with units of the Atlantic Fleet Mine Force; in 1956-1957 as Executive Officer in the USS NOTABLE (MSO-460), and in 1958-1959 in command of the USS VITAL (MSO-474). From July, 1959 to July, 1961 he served in the Undersea Warfare Branch of the Navy Hydrographic Office in Washington, D. C. A year at the Naval War College in 1961-1962 was followed by duty on the Staff of Commander Destroyer Squadron Six. During this assignment DESRON SIX actively participated in the Cuban Quarantine and related operations of October and November 1962. In December 1962 he reported aboard the USS EUGENE A. GREENE (DD-711) for duty as Executive Officer and additional duty as Commanding Officer during GREENE's FRAM I conversion. It was from this assignment that Commander Vecchione reported aboard the USS REEVES (DLG-24) as Executive Officer.

Commander Vecchione is married to the former Leila Mae Garrabrant of Ocean Grove, New Jersey. They have four children: Joel, 16; Michael, 14; Linda, 8; and Patricia, 3.

# SHIP'S INSIGNIA (front cover)

The REEVES insignia was created by the United States Army Institute of Heraldry and is composed of various heraldic symbols which have appeared repetitively on the coats of arms of the Reeves family. The pheons symbolize the bearing of arms and the flames trailing from them further indicate REEVES' missile capability. The chevron is, of course, a military device and the wavy upper edge represents the sea. REEVES' inherent strength as well as her capability to strike beneath the sea is represented by the scallop shell. The eagle symbolizes the United States, and its place above the shield signifies the guardian role of our Naval Forces. The mermaids also symbolize the seas, the operating medium of the REEVES. Admiral Reeves' rank is illustrated by the four stars appearing on each side of the border.
